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Welcome to the 54th season of Bach Cantata Vespers at Grace Lutheran Church.

This season's Bach Cantata Vespers celebrate the 300th anniversary of Bach's second yearlong cycle of cantatas, the Chorale Cycle. During his second year in Leipzig, 1724–25, Bach wrote a cantata for each Sunday and festival of the church year. Most of them were completely original works; a few were revivals of earlier compositions. Each cantata was based on a chorale familiar to his congregation, with original choruses and expressive arias describing doubt and sorrow, joy and faith.

It is no small thing that Bach's music continues to speak to people today, proclaiming the never-ending story of God's grace and mercy poured out for us in Jesus Christ.

This season includes two very special events in addition to our monthly cantatas: a concert by the Thomanerchor from Bach's church in Leipzig, Germany, and two performances of Bach's magnificent *Mass in B Minor*. Read more about these events in the pages ahead.

A mighty fortress is our God

The music of Bach's magnificent cantata on "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" first took shape in Weimar in 1715 as a Lenten cantata. He revised and expanded it in Leipzig, adding the splendid opening chorus at some point in the 1730s - achorus that has been called "the high-point of Bach's choralebased choral music." The cantata was not part of the second cycle that we are commemorating this season, but it has always been a favorite of worshipers at Bach Cantata Vespers!

Du Friedefürst, Herr Jesu Christ

You Prince of Peace, Lord Jesus Christ

Bach performed this cantata for the first time on the last Sunday of the church year, November 26, 1724, almost 300 years ago to the day when we will hear it at Grace. The cantata is based on a hymn by Jakob Ebert by the same name that speaks of the peace that only Christ can bring amidst the trials and tribulations of a believer's lifetime. This prayer for Christ's intervention holds meaning for us today, even as it brought comfort to 18th century Lutherans.



Dr. Mark Peters is professor of music and director of the Center for Teaching and the Good Life at Trinity Christian College in Palos Heights, Illinois. He teaches courses on music and the arts in relation to individuals, societies, and cultures, seeking to instill in students the perspective that practices of creating and of engaging human creativity are fundamental aspects of our shared humanity.

Peters offers insights into the cantatas being performed at each month's Bach Cantata Vespers service. Join us at 3:00 in the lower-level Seminar Room each month to learn more about the cantata you are about to hear in worship.

Peters holds a Ph.D. in historical musicology from the University of Pittsburgh. He is author of *A Woman's Voice in Baroque Music: Mariane von Ziegler and J. S. Bach* (Ashgate, 2008) and co-editor with Reginald L. Sanders of *Compositional Choices and Meaning in the Vocal Music of J. S. Bach* (Lexington, 2018).

Gelobet seist du, Jesu Christ

All praise be to you, Jesus Christ

Martin Luther's hymn for Christmas morning inspired this cantata for Christmas Day in 1724. Scored for soloists, choir, horns, oboes, timpani and strings, it proclaims the joyful news that Christ came to our world in order to bring us the treasures of heaven. The music is such a perfect celebration of the good news of Christmas that Bach presented it four more times during his tenure as Thomaskantor in Leipzig.

January 26 *BWV 111*

Was mein Gott will, das g'scheh allzeit

What my God wills, may that always happen

Bach's cantata for the third Sunday after Epiphany is based on a Reformation-era chorale text by Albert, Duke of Prussia, published in 1554. The scoring for this cantata is consistent with a Sunday less festive in nature, using only strings, oboes, and continuo. The spirited music expresses complete trust in God, in life's trials and in the face of death.

February 23 BWV 126

Erhalt uns, Herr, bei deinem Wort

Lord, keep us steadfast in your word

Martin Luther wrote *Erhalt uns, Herr, bei deinem Wort* as a hymn for children, a *Kinderlied*. Nearly 200 years later Bach used this chorale as the centerpiece of his cantata for Sexagesima, the second Sunday before Lent, when the appointed Gospel reading was Jesus' Parable of the Sower. We join in Luther's prayer: "Uphold us, Lord, by your word" as well as the cantata's final prayer for peace.

The Thomanerchor was founded in the year 1212 and is best known for its connection to Johann Sebastian Bach, who led the choir as Thomaskantor from 1723 until his death in 1750. The choir is made up of boys age 9 to 18 and sings every week in services at the St. Thomas Church in Leipzig. It also gives concerts across Germany and tours internationally. The choir's repertoire includes music, from the Renaissance to contemporary choral works, with a special emphasis on the music of J. S. Bach.

Mass in B Minor

The Mass in B Minor is Bach's last great masterwork, completed in 1749, the year before his death. Much of the music was composed earlier in Bach's lifetime, but here he assembles it into a unified and deeply moving statement of faith, a summation of a life's work dedicated to the glory of God. The Bach Cantata Vespers Chorus and Orchestra will be joined by singers from Chicago Choral Artists to present this magnificent music in two complete performances.

Am Abend aber desselbigen Sabbats

On the evening of the same Sabbath

Bach's project of writing weekly cantatas based on chorales began on Trinity Sunday in 1724 and ended on Palm Sunday in 1725 — not quite a full year. Instead of a chorale-based chorus, this cantata, composed for the First Sunday after Easter in 1725, opens with a cheery sinfonia. A recitative follows, quoting from the day's Gospel about Jesus bringing peace and comfort as he appears to his disciples gathered in a locked room on Easter evening.

On Christ's Ascension into heaven alone

Jesus' Ascension into heaven forty days after Easter is an integral part of the Easter story and an important festival on the church's calendar. Bach's 1725 cantata for the day is a festive one, opening with a chorale fantasia scored for choir, horns, oboes, strings, and continuo. The choir and orchestra will also perform a new work based on a sermon by John Donne from 1628 called *A Future Waking*, by Paul D. Weber, written in memory of beloved professor, pastor, and church musician Mark P. Bangert.
