Welcome to the 55th season of Bach Cantata Vespers!

We hope you will join us at these monthly worship services in which God's Word is proclaimed through the magnificent music of J. S. Bach.

Each service begins with a prelude at 3:45 p.m. offering interesting and varied repertoire for pipe organ, orchestra, and small ensembles. Vespers begins at 4:00 as we join our voices to sing the Service of Light, with its promise that Jesus Christ is "the light no darkness can overcome." Choral motets, hymns of faith, and excellent preaching follow, leading up to the cantata. Sent out with a final hymn, we depart, renewed and inspired for the days ahead.

This season we continue to celebrate the 300th anniversary of Bach's annual cantata cycles. This year's cantatas are largely drawn from Bach's third cycle of cantatas in Leipzig, spanning 1725–1727. The cantatas scheduled for November and February are new to us, having never before been performed at Bach Vespers.





Each month's service contains unique musical offerings. In September we welcome Chelsea Chen back to the organ at Grace to perform Samuel Barber's spectacular *Toccata Festiva* with the Bach Vespers orchestra. In October we hear Bach's beloved Orchestral Suite in D Major. Later in the season we welcome organists Steven Wente, Timothy Spelbring, and David Cherwien to play the prelude and lead congregational singing. And we will be ringing in 2026 with a cantata service at 7:00 p.m. on New Year's Eve!

In 2026 we again welcome Concordia University Chicago's Kapelle. May brings Eleanor Bartsch performing Gerald Finzi's breathtaking violin concerto. At this final service of the season, we will also hear from a special homilist, Pastor Robert George Moore from Bach's own church in Leipzig.

It is a full year of making music to the glory of God and, as Bach himself said, "the permissible delights of the soul." We cannot do it without you and your generous gifts. Mark Peters on Bach

Join us at 3:00 for pre-service lectures.

Dr. Mark Peters is professor of music and director of the Center for Teaching and the Good Life at Trinity Christian College in Palos Heights, Illinois. He teaches courses on music and the arts in relation to individuals, societies, and cultures, seeking to instill in students the perspective that practices of creating and of engaging human creativity are fundamental aspects of our shared humanity.

Each month Peters' pre-service lectures offer insights into the cantata that will be presented in the worship service. Join us at 3:00 p.m. in the Seminar Room on Grace's lower level to learn more about the background of the cantata and Bach's music.

Peters holds a Ph.D. in historical musicology from the University of Pittsburgh. He is the author of *A Woman's Voice in Baroque Music: Mariane von Ziegler and J. S. Bach* (Ashgate, 2008) and co-editor with Reginald L. Sanders of *Compositional Choices and Meaning in the Vocal Music of J. S. Bach* (Lexington, 2018).

Praise to the Lord, the almighty King of creation

Originally performed on the 12th Sunday after Trinity, August 19, 1725, this festive work based on the beloved Lutheran chorale opens our 55th year of Bach Cantata Vespers at Grace. Scored for a large Baroque orchestra and full complement of soloists and chorus, the music rings out with sounds of praise for the God who created, redeemed, and sustains us.

Renowned organist Chelsea Chen returns to Grace to perform Samuel Barber's *Toccata Festiva* as the prelude to the service at 3:45 p.m. This virtuosic work for organ and symphony orchestra will be presented in a version for chamber orchestra prepared by composer Mark Buller.

Gott der Herr ist Sonn und Schild

God the Lord is Sun and Shield

On Reformation Sunday we sing Bach's cantata *God the Lord is Sun and Shield,* first performed in Leipzig on Reformation Day, October 31, 1725. With the steady beat of timpani undergirding the horn obligato, the chorus proclaims the glorious "sun and shield" text from Psalm 84. The horns return in the third movement in the familiar chorale setting of Martin Rinkart's 17th century hymn "Now Thank We All Our God."

The prelude to this festive service is Bach's great Orchestral Suite in D Major. This rich and varied work for Baroque orchestra opens with a formal French overture. The familiar second movement, known as "Air on the G String," is followed by a trio of Baroque dances.

Blessed is the man

The cantata for November 23, the last Sunday in the church year, was first performed on December 26, 1725, the feast day of the first Christian martyr, Saint Stephen. This beautiful dialogue cantata is a conversation between Christ and the soul of the believer, represented by the bass and soprano soloists. The voice of Christ assures the soul that peace and life await in eternity, and the soprano's final aria is joyful and tender as the soul anticipates departing this earthly life to be with Jesus. This is the first performance of this beautiful cantata at Grace.

Praise God! Now the year comes to an end

On New Year's Eve we will hear this cheerful cantata written by Bach for the last Sunday of 1725. Its five concise movements thank God for the gifts of the past year and ask that these blessings continue in the year to come. The Baroque, dancelike opening aria for soprano is immediately followed by the chorale *Nun lob, mein Seel, den Herren* (My soul, now praise your maker), set by Bach in the older contrapuntal style of the church motet. Join us as we welcome a new year with prayer and praise!

January 18 *BWV 72*

Alles nur nach Gottes Willen

Everything according to God's will alone

This cantata for the Third Sunday after Epiphany was first performed on January 27, 1726. Drawing its themes from the biblical account of Jesus healing a leper, the cantata describes how the believer finds comfort in trusting that all things ultimately come to fulfillment in God's gracious will. The cantata concludes with the chorale Was mein Gott will, das g'scheh allzeit (What my God wills, that always occurs), a hymn of faith and contentment well known to Bach's Leipzig congregation.

The prelude to the service at 3:45 p.m. will be performed by Grace's string quartet-in-residence, the Kontras Quartet.

Settle the account! Word of thunder

Churches in Leipzig were not permitted to perform concerted music during the penitential seasons of Advent and Lent. So, During Lent of 2026 we look to a cantata from Bach's third annual cycle that was originally performed on the 9th Sunday after Trinity in July of 1725. Based on the parable in Luke 16 about a dishonest manager, the dramatic music of the opening aria shows an all-powerful God who demands accountability from the people. The later movements of the cantata, however, bring resolution as text and music remind listeners that Jesus' sacrificial death has paid their debt. This marks the first performance of this cantata in our series at Grace.

The organ prelude to the service at 3:45 p.m. is performed by Timothy Spelbring, a familiar presence as organist and continuo player for cantata services at Grace.

God so loved the world

Although this cantata was composed for the Second Day of Pentecost in 1725, its rich and buoyant setting of John 3:16 makes it appropriate for the Sunday of the Passion. This cantata is quite unusual in its structure, drawing on sources from an earlier cantata and concluding with a double fugue rich with imagery about the relationship between faith and the gift of eternal life.

Renowned organist, composer, and conductor David Cherwien plays the prelude at 3:45 p.m. and leads the congregational singing from the organ during the vespers service.

Wir müssen durch viel Trübsal in das Reich Gottes eingehen

We must enter the kingdom of God through much sorrow

The title for this cantata, written for the Third Sunday of Easter, is misleading. While the cantata does at first point to the suffering that Christians endure in the world, the initial sorrow changes to joyful Easter hope of a future life in the kingdom of God. The sinfonia for organ and orchestra and the opening chorus are based on movements from an earlier concerto, which Bach again reused for his concerto for harpsichord in D minor (BWV 1052).

We welcome the Kapelle of Concordia University Chicago as the guest choir for this cantata and their conductor, Dr. Charles P. Brown. Grace Cantor Michael D. Costello performs the organ solo in the cantata's sinfonia and the organ prelude to the service at 3:45 p.m.

God goes up with jubilation

Concluding the 55th year of Bach Cantata Vespers at Grace is the magnificent Ascension cantata *Gott fähret auf mit Jauchzen* (God goes up with jubilation), written by Bach for the feast of the Ascension and first performed on May 30, 1726. The large orchestra, complete with three trumpets and timpani, points to the festive nature of the day. After the opening chorus, each vocal soloist takes a turn with a recitative and aria before the final chorale.

Eleanor Bartsch, first violinist with the Kontras Quartet and violinist with Lyric Opera of Chicago, joins the Bach Cantata Vespers Orchestra to perform Gerald Finzi's Violin Concerto as the prelude to the service at 3:45 p.m.
